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From Your Pastor

Reflection and Looking Ahead:

I am in the midst of my seventh year as your pastor. Seven years is an important number in scripture: seven days of creating, the Sabbath on the seventh day. I am grateful for the seven years we've had togeth-

er so far; to be part of a community that is flexible and grace-filled, full of love and care. Part of the rhythm that is encouraged for pastors and congregations is a sabbatical, often after seven years. Looking ahead, I will be taking a sabbatical in 2025 and the Session has approved those dates as April 28-July 28, 2025. This will enable us both to have time for renewal and hopefully refreshed energy afterwards.

Reflecting on this past year, we continue to gather and worship, to break bread together and to serve. We have strengthened relationships with our interfaith neighbors this year, hosting an interfaith gathering, events with Rabbi Bigman and Imam Chaudhry, as well as having the joint dinner with the Islamic Center. I pray that those relationships continue to strengthen. We've welcomed new members into our midst and said farewell to others who have moved away. We've gathered most months this year for a meal after worship, strengthening our relationships with each other, and continued to provide for Advent House and the Refugee Development Center.

Thank you for allowing me the privilege to serve as your pastor. I hope you are inspired by the stories told in this report, the ministries and mission of this church. There is much joy and love in this congregation and much work to do. I am grateful to do that work together.

What's Changed This Year?

We have further lived into the increased building usage. Every day of the week our building is being used, not just by us, but the community. The Session continues to discern how we can further serve our immediate neighborhood and let others know about the wonderful things happening at Eastminster. We welcome your input. The Session has made the decision that this will be the last Annual Program Meeting that will take place in the summer. In 2025, we will move to having only one Annual Meeting that will take place in early February.


What I've Done for Continuing Education

Interfaith Outreach

This year we explored radical hospitality by reaching out to and learning from our neighboring houses of faith. Events included:

A news conference on Nov. 7 in which local ministers expressed their support for the Jewish and Islamic communities in the wake of the Oct. 7 attacks and the following Gaza war.

An Interfaith Gathering of Solidarity and Hope on Nov. 16. The church was packed as people from all faiths around Greater Lansing gathered to support each other. The focus of this gathering was to declare that we, as a community will not tolerate anti-Semitism, Is-



lamophobia, or any form of hate or bigotry. Eastminster facilitated the gathering of donations for Kehillat Israel, Shaarey Zedek and the Islamic Center of Greater Lansing. All donations were earmarked to help pay for their increased security costs.

A dinner and educational session with Rabbi Amy Bigman on Wednesday, Jan. 31 as we studied the

Book of Esther. She shared some of the traditions surrounding the holiday and the interpretations Jewish people have of the story. Rabbi Bigman also opened the time up for any questions about Judaism and Israel.

A visit to the Islamic Center on Feb. 22 with Imam Sohail Chaudry. We were given a tour of the center, learned about the basics of Islam and observed a time of prayer.

Members of the Islamic Center came to Eastminster on May 1. We shared a meal and Imam Chaudry and Rev. Stroble talked about the role of women in each faith's Scriptures.

Day of Remembrance for MSU Shooting

Tuesday, February 13, 2024 marked the oneyear anniversary of the mass shooting that took place at MSU. The university canceled classes for the day to mark the occasion.

We remembered Arielle Anderson, Brian Fraser, and Alexandria Verner as well as the other students injured and the collective trauma the campus and wider community endured.

Eastminster opened its doors to students, faculty, staff and community members who were seeking community and a reflective space for the day. Throughout the day, Elder Robin Bell led a guided art reflection and UKirk Campus Minister Neil Myer led a worship service of remembrance. We served lunch. Some UKirk board members offered ministry of presence along with tangible and logistical support including Rev. Kristin Stroble (ex-officio).

All who participated were grateful to have a space to just be and to have the different options for observing that important day including worship and prayer. UKirk expresses deep gratitude for the ongoing and incredible hospitality and sanctuary Eastminster provides as part of its ongoing support of UKirk and the various aspects of this ministry.

Ministry Highlights

Community Connections

The Community Connections Team worked to organize and offer meaningful activities that build relationships and foster connections within our church family and outside the church within the surrounding community. We also continued tried and true activities and initiatives the church has enthusiastically supported and participated in for many years.

We are blessed to have a generous and giving congregation who always steps up to provide meals and items that help individuals and families in our community thrive and survive.

Advent House

We continue to support Advent House with meals. During the winter months (January through March) soup and sandwiches (at the request of Advent House because they were very popular last year) were provided, and as usual, volunteers came through with enough food to feed at least 50 people. During the remaining months of the year, we delivered a rotating assortment of casseroles on the second Saturday of the month.

We continued our support of the day shelter and revised the items list by eliminating cleaning products, adding family-size boxes of cereal, and focusing on more personal care products.

The committee received Session approval to provide Advent House via North Westminster Presbyterian Church with a \$500 one-time financial gift to assist with costs associated with cleaning the day

shelter. Advent House has been experiencing financial challenges with maintaining the day shelter.

Christian Services

Thanksgiving baskets were provided to 10 families. The committee purchased turkeys and church volunteers supplied the remaining items for a Thanksgiving meal. Several church members volunteered to deliver the baskets directly to the families.

Refugee Development Center

We committed to providing five welcome kits per month containing various pantry staples and household products. The kits are now assembled by the children in attendance and a few adult volunteers after the monthly church luncheon. A representative of the RDC did a presentation after worship describing their work and the positive effect supporters like Eastminster have on the lives of the refugees that settle in the Greater Lansing area.



Mission Funding

A funding proposal was received from Water4Life to provide water filters to families in a Guatemalan village. The filters clean the local water supply for families to use for drinking and cooking. After reviewing materials and hearing a presentation, the committee submitted a request for \$7,500 to the Endowment and Investment Committee to fund this project. The request was approved and a check sent.

Dr. Eleanore Kue, a Lansing physician, did an informational presentation after fellowship time to describe her dedication to end poverty in Greater Lansing. Dr. Kue described her new venture to serve as a liaison between individuals and families in need of assistance with housing, food insecurity, health care, day care, and a host of other supportive services. The committee made a \$2,000 donation to help fund this work.

Throughout the year, we gathered in fellowship with each other and with our neighbors in the community.


Events this past program year included:



We thank Robin Bell, Mike Brown, Linda Hardenbergh, Heather Myer and Susan Smalley for performing operating the livestream for the church and our members and others who may not be able to make it to church.



An important element of worship is communion, typically the first Sunday of the month. Gathering over a meal is Christ-like and we have adopted the practice of eating together after worship the first Sunday of the month. We share the monthly meal preparation sometimes with the Community Connections Committee.

Using the projector and screen, we celebrated All Saints Day on October 29, displaying pictures of members, friends and loved ones who had died during the previous year, accompanied by a single bell tone.

In 2023, Christmas Eve was on a Sunday, so there were two services. The morning service was an audience participation telling of

the Nativity story in Matthew and the evening service was a more traditional service, which included an Eastminster handbell ensemble, led by Heather Myer.

Sulin Campbell led members in singing special anthems twice throughout the year—at Christmas and at Easter.

Mr. Rogers series

Our early fall education series was centered on the ministry and life's work of Fred Rogers to go along with the sermon series. An intergenerational group gathered for several Sundays and examined different ways that he lived out his calling: "the broadcasting of grace throughout the land."

Visio Divina

We engaged in the practice of Visio Divina, exploring the artwork that accompanied our scriptures and theme of the Advent se-

Bible Studies



Pentecost


We held an intergenerational gathering that told the story of Pentecost through shapes.

A book discussion group on *The Kingdom, the Power, and the Glory* by Tim Alberta met after worship on Sundays in February and March. The book is concerned with how the evangelical wing of Christianity has become poisonously entangled with politics, but it has lessons for us persons of faith. The Rev. Dr. Jeff O'Neill led the discussion.



In the spring, a book discussion group formed around *The Story of More: How We Got to Climate*



Change and Where We Go from Here, by Hope Jahren. Called "the essential primer on climate change that will leave an indelible impact on anyone who reads it," Jahren asks "the essential question of our time: how can we learn to live on a finite planet?" There are serious ethical and faith issues raised in the book, and people met to discuss what's at stake. Jeff O'Neill led most of the discussion with Josh Vermaas leading one session.


Deacons

- Ongoing contact with the congregation by making telephone calls or sending text messages/emails to those who are in need of personal contact or are homebound:
- Preparing and delivering meals to our many members for various reasons such as illness, family birth, hospital or physical rehab recovery;
- Continuing our long-standing tradition of mailing cards to all members of our church for birthdays, anniversaries, get well, or just thinking of you and sending holiday cards to members who cannot attend church in person. In 2023-2024, approximately 260 cards were sent to church members:
- Staying connected with our younger congregation members who attend college by sending gift cards to local food establishments during midterms and final exams;
- Meeting monthly in person and on Zoom;
- Serving as head ushers and coordinating additional ushers and front door greeters for Sunday worship services, memorial services and special church events;
- Increasing the engagement of children to serve as acolytes and providing nametags so that they feel included and acknowledged for their service;
- Preparing and serving communion on the first Sunday of the month and for special worship services;
- Updating our plate collection practices for handling cash offerings;
- Hosting a housewarming shower for Alex and Tamar Mikeladze on behalf of the congregation in gratitude for their involvement in our church life;
- Hosting Fellowship Hour every Sunday after worship, and for special events, interfaith gatherings, birthdays, funerals, and other church activities (approximately 70);
- Coordinating and/or providing transportation for individuals who are unable to drive to church functions;
- Coordinating memorial services and luncheons: and
- Providing indirect support for other committees' activities as requested.



UKirk Campus Ministry



UKirk at Michigan State feeds hungry college students in body, mind, soul and spirit with the radically inclusive love of Jesus Christ so that they may embody that love in the Church and the world.

UKirk continues to be a transformative faith community and a vital part of the college experience for our students. This past year we had UKirkers from Pennsylvania, Illinois, Georgia, Virginia, Texas, California, and many places in Michigan. We are grateful for the mission support of Eastminster and all the ways this congregation engages and supports this ministry.

UKirkers spent quality time together at Montreat in January.

Some highlights from 2023-24 year included:
